The City of Beeville Police Department serves around 14,000 citizens across 6.8 square miles, 95 miles of streets and 1,398 city blocks. Thousands of visitors and various vehicles, both personal and commercial, also pass through or around the city daily.

The Department sworn strength is a total of thirty-two (32) funded positions.

- **Sworn personnel**: BPD is budgeted for Twenty-three (23*) sworn officers:
 - eleven (11) police officers;
 - four (4) Patrol Sergeants;
 - three (3) Criminal Investigations Division Detective Sergeants;
 - one (1) Special Crimes Unit Sergeant
 - one (1) Patrol Division Lieutenant;
 - one (1) Criminal Investigations Division Lieutenant;
 - one (1) Assistant Chief of Police and a
 - one (1) Chief of Police.
 - one (1) Reserve police officer

*Note: As of the end of 2024, The BPD is currently at its fully allotted police officer

positions for the first time in more than twelve (12) years.

- **Non-sworn personnel**: There are nine (9) civilian members.
 - six (6) Telecommunicators,
 - two (2) department clerks;
 - one (1) Evidence Manager/Communications Supervisor/ Administrative Assistant.

CRIME STATISTICS

<u>Overview of Crime in Beeville</u>

In 2024, we experienced a rise in the crime rate in several areas. Burglaries increased from 92 in 2023 to 109, an 18% rise. Violent crimes such as assault, aggravated assault, kidnapping, and sexual assaults also rose. Reports of fraud, and arrests for narcotics sales and possession increased compared to 2023. Larceny reports dropped by 44%, criminal mischief (*the intentional destruction of another's property*) also dropped.

Tracking Crime

Index crimes, also known as **Part I offenses**, are a specific set of serious criminal crimes that are tracked and reported by law enforcement agencies to both the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). These crimes include:

- Homicide
- Rape
- Robbery
- Burglary
- Aggravated Assault
- Larceny over \$50
- Motor vehicle theft
- Arson

For clarity to the reader, some of the crime labels used above are not used in the Texas Penal Code (TPC). An example is that the elements of Rape in the Texas Penal Code are listed under the Sexual Assault statute, and the elements of Larceny and Motor Vehicle theft all fall under the TPC under a consolidated Theft Statute.

Early in 2024, the department launched the <u>No Trespassing Program</u>, allowing businesses and property owners to post signs and permit officers to arrest violators, resulting in 41 arrests for trespassing.

Efforts to combat illegal drug activity continued, leading to more drug-related cases, arrests, and search warrants. We remain committed to addressing crime linked to illegal drug use and distribution, including property crimes like thefts and burglaries.

PATROL DIVISION

Lieutenant Christopher (Chris) Haller leads the BPD Patrol Division, which includes eleven uniformed officers and four sergeants. This division patrols Beeville's streets, ensuring citizen safety and responding to service calls 24/7. As the primary operational unit, they deliver general police services, enforce laws and ordinances, respond to calls, conduct initial investigations, make arrests, and gather evidence.

Patrol officers aim to prevent crime, investigate complaints, apprehend offenders, manage traffic safety, and enforce laws. Effective patrolling requires gaining residents' trust through community policing, which has grown since the 1980s.

Officers assigned to the Patrol Division must possess an understanding of the modern principles, methods, and procedures of the technical aspects of law enforcement, including:

- Criminal investigation
- Identification and investigative techniques
- Techniques in collection and preservation of evidence
- Rules of evidence
- Arrest procedures
- Search and seizure procedures
- Patrol techniques
- Intelligence gathering/sharing
- Knowledge of criminal and traffic law and enforcement
- Crime prevention and public relations
- Thorough and current knowledge of federal, state, and local criminal laws and the court decisions that affect their application.

K9 Unit – The K-9 program focuses on drug interdiction, mainly on U.S. Highway 59. Officer Thomas Dozier and his partner Uzi have seized illicit drugs and related money on numerous occasions and represent the point of the spear in the department's war on drugs. The program also assists local, state, and federal agencies and regularly conducts sweeps in area schools.

DWI Enforcement – During 2024 the BPD focused on Driving While Intoxicated offenses, with 61 arrests.

- 44 Hispanic,
- 8 White,
- 3 Black
- 4 were under 21
- 24 were 21 to 29,
- 11 were 30 to 39,
- 8 were 50-59, and
- 2 were over 60 years of age.

The top three reasons for DWI arrests made after the officer observed;

- #1 Speeding (13)
- #2 Crash (12)

#3 – Weaving/fail to maintain single lane (9)

- The top three (3) times periods for the majority of DWI arrests by BPD for 2024 were 12am-1am (19); 1am to 2am (6); and 2am to 3am (4).
- Three (3) top days are Sunday- 15; Thursday and Saturday tied with 12 each,
- The average blood alcohol content (BAC) of offenders was .12, the state law minimum is .0.08 BAC.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION DIVISION

The Criminal Investigation Division (CID) for BPD is led by Lt. Chris Vasquez and is comprised of four (4) plainclothes Detective Sergeants and one (1) Police Officer-Investigator. This Division is responsible for the investigation of;

- crimes against persons,
- domestic violence,
- property crimes,
- sexual assaults, and
- vice and narcotics offenses

Detectives are also responsible for processing crime scenes, preparing case files and evidence for the prosecuting attorney for filing of charges, conducting follow-up

investigations, testifying before grand juries and in criminal trials; locate and interview witnesses; and follows cases through court to completion.

In addition, Detectives conduct sensitive investigations into allegations of official misconduct or violations of law or policy by civilian members or BPD police officers and conducts internal affairs investigations as required. Further, Detectives maintain contact with informants in obtaining information about cases under investigation and review intelligence from various sources.

SPECIAL CRIMES UNIT

Department members assigned to the Special Crimes Unit are responsible for Narcotics, Gambling, prostitution, and Organized Crime Investigations. These investigators work closely with the Bee County Sheriff's Office and state and federal law enforcement agencies to fight the war on drugs and other vice related crimes.

The Methamphetamine seizure shown above took place at a mobile home where two children lived. BPD Special Crimes Investigators executed the search warrant before they returned from school, arrested the dealer, and confiscating the drugs and drug money. Drugs were found in areas easily accessible to the children. CPS was notified.

COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION

The radio and in-car computer terminals are essential tools for police officers, allowing them to stay connected with dispatchers and other officers while on the field. Radios provide real-time communication, enabling those officers to quickly receive updates, coordinate responses, and call for assistance. In-car computer terminals enhance this capability by allowing officers to access and transmit written information, further supporting efficient decision-making.

The Communications Division plays a key role in ensuring that public information is managed properly, and that dispatch is responsive to various emergency services. Telecommunicators prioritize calls based on urgency, ensuring that critical situations are handled first, while still addressing all calls in due time.

By relaying crucial details such as location, suspect descriptions, and updates to officers in the field, dispatchers ensure officers have the information they need to respond effectively and safely. This collaboration between officers and dispatchers ensures that police, fire, and EMS services can operate efficiently and effectively in all situations.

RECORDS DIVISION

While the Beeville Police Department is comprised of a number of functional areas, such as Administration, Communications, Patrol, CID, the one that many citizens may not be aware of is the Records Section; a critical area that is staffed by 2

employees and dedicated to the review and filing of internal reports, preparation of CID records and files, management of wrecker and business and residential alarm permits. fulfilling and providing open records requests, as well as several additional tasks. The division also handles the expungement of records, non-disclosure orders, sealing of juvenile records, and both are licensed telecommunicators and serve as backup dispatchers. The division located at the BPD headquarters, located at 402 N. Washington, and is open to the public Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

NEW EQUIPMENT

- **Police Vehicles:** Three new patrol units and two CID vehicles were placed on the streets in 2024 to replace older units. 3 additional vehicles were approved by the City Council in October with delivery in March of 2025.
- **Body Cameras**: New body cameras were purchased in October for all officers with implementation in February of 2025.
- **In-car Cameras:** All Patrol vehicles will now have in-car cameras to be installed in early 2025.
- **<u>New bullet resistant vests</u>**: New tactical vests were purchased for all officers to replace old vests in 2024.

USE OF FORCE REPORTING

BPD collects its Use of Force statistics as a "best practice" and compiles <u>Use of</u> <u>Force</u> statistics and reports those figures in the Annual Report to maintain our pledge of transparency. The Department continually reviews and studies each use of force incident to determine if the appropriate level of resistance and force used by the officer(s) to overcome resistance.

BIAS BASED/RACIAL PROFILING

Bias-based or racial profiling involves law enforcement actions based solely on race, ethnicity, or national origin rather than behavior or legal reasons. The Beeville Police Department will not tolerate and strictly prohibits bias-based or racial profiling, demonstrating its commitment to fair and impartial service. Citizens can file a written complaint if they believe they have experienced such profiling. Complaints can be submitted to any department employee to ensure proper handling and accountability.
